

WHY LEARN ARABIC?

- 1. Arabic is an official language of the United Nations.
- 2. Arabic is the 5th most commonly spoken native language in the world. It is the official language of over 23 countries and there are well over 400 million native speakers of the language. These speakers are largely concentrated in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA), but there are minority groups of native speakers throughout the world.
- 3. Learning Arabic promotes an intercultural understanding of the region, which is essential in today's geo-political dialogue.
- 4. There is currently a high demand, yet low supply of Arabic-speakers. Those students who study Arabic will be provided with a skill that will set them apart from their fellow students at graduation.

WHY LEARN KISWAHILI?

- 1. This language is spoken in a very large area across central and southern Africa. It is the official language spoken in Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and is spoken throughout the African Great Lakes region.
- 2. Approximately 15 million people speak KiSwahili as their first language.
- 3. Learning KiSwahili promotes an intercultural understanding of the East-Africa region. This is important in that Africa has also become a region of increasing importance in business and international affairs.
- 4. Students who study KiSwahili will be provided with a unique skillset that will set them apart from their fellow students at graduation.
