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The Teaching of Africa

If you are an educator, curriculum specialist, librarian, or a business or media professional, "The Teaching of Africa" will transform your perspective and equip you with ideas and practical approaches to the teaching and understanding of Africa. This intensive introductory course in African Studies is designed to help educators learn about Africa in a way that they can then teach confidently about its peoples, civilizations, and cultures. The course is also developed to help transform other professionals' perspectives about the continent and to enable participants to identify and access unique resources about Africa. The program includes several handson cultural and artistic projects complemented by a full-day field trip to cultural sites in New York City. Understanding Medvedev's Russia

Registration fee: \$250 The 28th annual Yale-Hopkins Summer Seminar will be held at Yale and in New York. The first week and a half will focus on content, examining the tumultuous events of the post-Soviet years in their historical, economic, and social context. Topics will include: political life and the ambiguous drift toward authoritarianism; a resurgent Russia's relations with Ukraine, Georgia, and other neighbors of the "near abroad"; the economics of oil and reform; Russian-American relations; Russia and Europe; byt - getting by in everyday life; the future of Russian literature; Orthodoxy and religious conflict; soviet and post-soviet film; and education at the crossroads. Program includes an all-day field trip to New York City on Saturday, July 11. On the last three days, participants will take part in the NCSS-PIER Conference. Registration fee for the two-week program is \$250, and includes all texts and materials. LATIN AMERICAN AND IBERIAN STUDIES

Latin America and the Cold War

What defines Latin America during the Cold War period? Apart from looking at very obvious manifestations of Cold War politics in Latin America, the program will look at less obvious ones, as well as the period's effects on politics, the economy, and culture in the region today. Focusing on the Cold War and its legacies, the first Yale-Georgetown Summer Institute for Educators will explore the geography, politics, histories, and economics of the Cold War era. Experts on the Cold War will share their expertise during this dynamic, intensive, interdisciplinary week. The program will be complemented by a three-day field study to Washington, D.C. (July 11-14), and will include site visits to various museums, Latin American embassies, governmental and non-governmental organizations related to the Cold War. On the last three days, participants will take part in the NCSS-PIER Conference. Registration fee for the New Haven program is \$250, and includes all texts and materials. The field study to Washington D.C. is \$200. Health and Conflict in the Middle Fast

When Americans turn on the television today, they are barraged with stories and images of conflicts taking place in the Middle East. What are the historical roots of these conflicts and what have they meant for the health and well being of the citizens of the region? Violent conflict between states within the region and on the international arena has been a primary cause of poor health outcomes and high mortality for the peoples of the Middle East. Experts from the fields of public health, Middle Eastern studies, and anthropology will share their expertise during this interdisciplinary week and a half of study on health and conflict. Further, the role of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) working to create humanitarian assistance in the region will be explored, with an emphasis on the way programming is planned to achieve positive health and social outcomes. The course is designed to allow educators to gain the ability to teach about the way in which conflict is impacting the everyday lives of citizens of the Middle East. On the last three days, participants will take part in the NCSS-PIER Conference. Registration fee for the two-week program is \$250, and includes all texts and materials.
